Until January 2006, I was the Library Webmaster and was responsible for the delivery of library services through electronic means. I designed the legal information systems through which our students and faculty obtained the information they need. Our website was largely driven by database applications which I designed and implemented. I also converted the Faculty Bibliography from paper to the Web, and created an editing system which allowed the individual faculty member to make changes in their bibliography. In addition, I digitized the *Ye Olde Exam Book*, storing the exams in a database and making them available to the students through a Web application. Other projects included the design, installation, and configuration of a proxy server to allow our community access to whatever web resources we have subscribed wherever in the world they happen to be; the redesign of the ILLiad interlibrary loan interface from the non-standards compliant default system to a new, compliant version that is much more intuitive; and the conversion of our websites to bring them into compliance with the W3C Web Standards and the ADA accessibility requirements.

From the the summer of 1998 until August, 1999, I supervised the Circulation/Access Services Department, with two full-time and 10 full-time-equivalent part-time employees. I rationalized and documented our circulation processes so that we deliver a consistent and dependable service to our patrons. This involved eliminating pointless rules, streamlining bureaucratic processes, logging transactions for accountability, cross-training employees, and requesting appropriate staffing levels to ensure that the job can be done.

***Chief of the Department of Student and Library Computer Services,***

Summer 1994 - Spring 1996

I was responsible for all student computing at the law school and for law library computer services, and together with the law school's Network Supervisor, for the coordination of all computer services at the law school. I supervised the installation of a Novell® 3.11 LAN, and its upgrade to Novell® 3.12, 4.0, and 4.01, and was its systems administrator. I supervised a department with 3 full-time computer professionals and over 300 hours of part-time student help each week. In addition to the Novell® Network, I also administered UNIX and Windows NT® networks. In the law school's move to its new technologically-advanced facility, I played a principal role in the design of the law library and the technology systems. I also represented the law school on several University Computing Center committees and boards.

***Chief of the International Law Department and Reference Librarian,***

Spring 1987 - Summer 1994

I was the first International Law Librarian at the W.C.L. Library, and the first European Communities Librarian as well. During my tenure in this position we greatly improved our International Law collection and made it more accessible to our students and faculty. In addition, I supervised the W.C.L. Student Computing Lab and hired its first full-time manager.

It focuses on public international legal dispute resolution and the structures responsible for it. I also supervise independent studies and Upper-Level Writing Requirement papers.

For four years I taught the two-semester introductory legal research and writing course, which stresses the fundamentals of being a lawyer to first-year law students, teaching them the building blocks for their profession.

The Centre is the think-tank for the Hague Academy of International Law, and is convened each summer to research and debate a subject chosen by the Curatorium of the Academy. The Centre produces a report stating its conclusions as to the current state of the law and recommending directions for the future development of the law. I was the only participant from the United States in the 1989 Centre. Our general topic was the Right of Asylum, and my specific contribution was a paper on the Organization of American States Convention on Territorial Asylum and its relationship to the Geneva Convention on the Status of Refugees and Protocol.
