The Women and the Law Clinic teaches students to be skilled, reflective, ethical, and thoughtful practitioners. Students study case theory, client interviewing and counseling, and trial skills over the course of a year-long clinic for 14 credits. Responsibilities include developing course materials, assignments, simulations, and teaching in the weekly seminar and Rounds.

Supervise student attorneys who represent clients with a variety of legal matters, largely in DC Superior Court. Matters include child support, child custody, child neglect and domestic violence.

*Director and Supervising Attorney, January 2004 – June 2006*

Develop training materials and conduct trainings for over 50 first-year and second-year law students who volunteer at the Essex County Superior Court in the Domestic Violence Unit;

Supervise student volunteers who provide domestic violence litigants with an overview of the legal process and assist in obtaining Temporary and Final Restraining Orders. During 2004, volunteers attended over 500 hours of training and court observation and assisted over 350 domestic violence victims in the courthouse.

The DVAP Director collaborates with domestic violence service providers, court personnel; participates in Essex County Domestic Violence Working Group; co-chairs Inter-Courts Subcommittee of the ECDVWG;

Writes and administers \$100,000 grant; participates in Public Interest Law Committee; collaborates with Director of Pro Bono and Public Interest Programs.

Develop syllabus, course materials, assignments, and simulations for 6-credit class (which requires students to work 20 hours weekly).

Teach weekly seminar to train law students. Students study case theory, client interviewing, and trial skills such as opening and closing arguments, and direct and cross examinations, and examine theories of gender oppression and the role of domestic violence within the larger context of women's rights.

Supervise student attorneys who represent survivors of domestic violence in contested Final Restraining Order hearings in the Essex County Superior Court; supervise community education projects.
