This article discusses the emergence of administrative law jurisprudence that portrays the Chief Executive as the “most constitutionally significant actor in the regulatory state.” In particular, this Article suggests that the term “Chief Executive” conveys the image that the President plays an independent role in shaping domestic policy. This article summarizes a series of Supreme Court cases in which the Court relied on definitions of executive power in its reasoning, resulting in shaping the institution and its role with administrative agencies.
