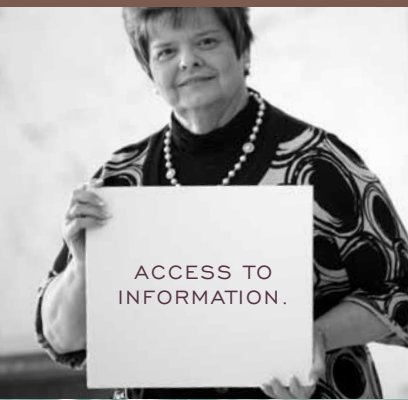

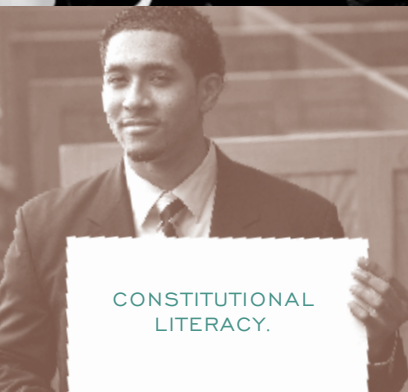

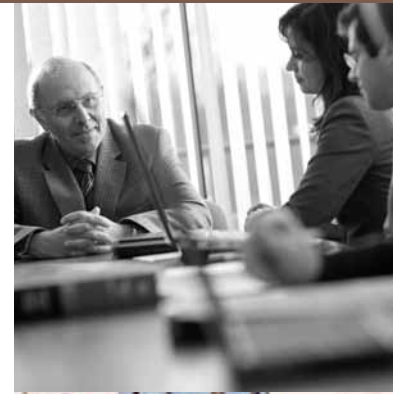
## LL.M. IN LAW AND GOVERNMENT.

This is an LL.M. with a difference. Designed for domestic and international law graduates who have an interest in U.S. government and politics, democracy, and the rule of law, the American University Washington College of Law Master of Laws in Law and Government takes students on a broad examination of cross-cutting issues. There is a reason for this expansive approach. Our organizing educational principle is that the best prepared lawyers and analysts in fields of regulatory law not only have a firm grasp of particular subjects, but also a mastery of theories, political forces, and institutional realities that define public law in the United States. So while we invite students to focus deeply on a sub-field of regulatory law, we also encourage study of the broader perspective.

### LL.M. APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

Applicants must have completed a law degree (JD) at a U.S. law school accredited by the American Bar Association, or at a foreign law school (Bachelor of Laws) with equivalent standards. In addition, students must submit the following materials:

- Official Copies of Academic Records
- Two Letters of Recommendation
- Statement of Purpose
- Non-native English Speakers: Official Proof of Competency in English
- Application Fee



### LL.M. PROGRAM CURRICULUM.

The LL.M. is a 24-credit degree that can be completed full-time in one academic year or part-time to fit your schedule. We provide flexibility so that it works for your life and your career. U.S.-trained LL.M. students take The Washington Lawyer, a two-credit course that provides students an overview of what it means to be an effective “Washington lawyer.” Internationally trained LL.M. students take American Legal Institutions, a three-credit class that covers substantive U.S. law and legal research and writing. Both courses satisfy the writing requirement for the LL.M. degree.

What is often most astounding to those investigating this Program is the depth and breadth of our curriculum. We believe in providing intellectual options, so this LL.M. is especially deep in federal law and includes offerings dealing with states and localities, as well as with international and global issues, reflecting the increasing interdependence of world society. Whatever your interest, we have coursework to match.

#### BRANDON CAREY '06

LL.M. in Law and Government, Concentration in Constitutional Law and Civil Rights

After obtaining his JD from Oklahoma City University School of Law, Brandon decided to pursue an LL.M. in order to satisfy his desire to further study constitutional law and civil rights and to eventually obtain a position in the federal government. While in the program, Brandon secured an externship with the U.S. Department of Education, Office for Civil Rights. This position married his law degree and studies in civil rights with his Bachelor's degree in education. After completing the LL.M. in 2006, Brandon used his connections through his externship to help secure a permanent position. He is now an attorney with the U.S. Department of Education, Office for Civil Rights working to enforce certain civil rights laws on educational institutions that receive money from the federal government.

#### JUAN BLANCO DÁVILA '07

LL.M. in Law and Government, Specialization in Communications Law and Policy

Prior to choosing our LL.M. Program, Juan taught Constitutional Law at Universidad Sergio Arboleda, School of Law. He also worked as a negotiator for the U.S.-Andean Free Trade Agreement. Juan chose this program because it offered valuable one-to-one relationships with faculty and combined programs on Administrative Law and Regulatory Practice and Communications Law and Policy. For Juan, the people were a big part of his decision. “Professor Ahranjani taught me how to reach a dream and Senator Raskin taught me how to reach excellence.” Juan was awarded the Scholar of the Year 2006-2007 and received the Judge Jerry M. #### LEIGH WARREN '10

LL.M. in Law and Government, Specialization in Health Law and Policy

After obtaining her JD from Columbia University and Ph.D. from University of California, Berkeley, Leigh worked as a patent attorney where she was exposed to drug regulatory matters. She found the subject fascinating and knew that to change practice areas she would need a solid foundation in food and drug law, as well as general health law. She entered the LL.M. Program full time. “Not only was I able to take food and drug law, the core Health Law and Policy curriculum guided me toward the necessary courses for a strong foundation in health law,” Leigh says. She completed an independent study jointly supervised by the Pan American Health Organization, which matured into an article that has been accepted for publication. The Program also gave Leigh the opportunity to intern at the FDA's Office of Policy and the Public Health Division of HHS, Office of General Counsel. After graduation, Leigh was awarded a Commissioner's Fellowship at the FDA, a two-year appointment working with the Bioresearch Monitoring Division.

## SPECIALIZED PROGRAMS.

### SUMMER INSTITUTE ON LAW AND GOVERNMENT.

In this summer program, timely topics and renowned faculty come together for two unique weeks. The courses and events will expose you to a multitude of networking and learning opportunities involving nationally recognized lawyers, academics, and government officials analyzing the most pressing issues of the day. Flexible scheduling makes it possible for law students and practicing attorneys to craft the curriculum that best fits their individual needs and interests exposing you to important and timely new academic content while respecting your time. Recent courses have included Election and Campaign Finance Law, The Roberts Court, and Protecting Consumers in Financial Markets. Academic and CLE credit is offered.

### AN SJD FOR THE BOLDEST AND BRAVEST.

The Doctor of Juridical Science (SJD) Program selects outstanding candidates who are prepared to write a doctoral-level dissertation in law, who will make original contributions to the legal literature, and who have a strong intellectual commitment to advanced legal study. This is comparable to a Ph.D. dissertation in the humanities or social sciences. It is an intense program and, at the same time, extremely rewarding. The SJD Program covers a breadth of legal topics and takes pride in its diverse community of candidates and faculty. SJD candidates represent a distinct intellectual community and go on to pursue an array of scholarly careers in the U.S. and abroad.

### HEALTH LAW AND POLICY PROJECT.

Where is law more exciting these days than in the field of health? The Health Law and Policy Project, directed by Practitioner-in-Residence Corrine Parver '82, features our **LL.M. Specialization in Health Law and Policy** that prepares attorneys to make a difference in this ever-changing environment. Every academic year, more than a dozen health law courses are offered, covering topics such as medical liability, food and drug law, disability rights, managed care, genetics, health policy, fraud and abuse prevention, international health organizations, public health, and more. Students may also earn academic credit for work experience through externships with health care associations, government agencies, and law firms focusing on health industry clients.

The student-run *Health Law and Policy Brief* provides informative works from health care practitioners, attorneys, and students on cutting-edge legal and policy issues, and features columns highlighting important issues in the field as well as health care regulatory updates. The annual **Health Law and Policy Summer Institute**, provides JD and LL.M. students and practitioners with training in a broad spectrum of health law and policy topics. This two-week program covers theoretical and practical aspects of health law and policy, and offers academic or CLE credit.

### JURIST-IN-RESIDENCE PROGRAM.

The Jurist-in-Residence Program is designed to bring a prominent judge to the law school each fall to meet with students, faculty, and alumni, and share insights on important topics facing the nation's judiciary. The visiting Jurist meets informally and formally with student groups and faculty over a one or two day period. Past Jurists have included The Honorable Kim Wardlaw, U.S. Court of Appeals for the 9th Circuit and The Honorable Dolores Sloviter, U.S. Court of Appeals for the 3rd Circuit.

### INSIDE OFFICIAL WASHINGTON SERIES.

This series of programs allows students to learn about law and government by visiting the headquarters of various federal agencies in Washington, D.C. Visits typically include a tour of the agency's headquarters, a speech by a senior attorney or agency official about a current legal issue, and a panel discussion about internship and job opportunities at the agency. Past visits have included the Department of Justice, Department of Homeland Security, Department of Health and Human Services, and the Patent and Trademark Office.

## THE MARSHALL-BRENNAN CONSTITUTIONAL LITERACY PROJECT.

---

Law students teaching high school students about constitutional law and about their rights as citizens – if that isn't the very definition of empowerment, what is? It's the concept behind the Marshall-Brennan Constitutional Literacy Project at American University Washington College of Law. This is where JD and LL.M. law students teach courses on constitutional law and juvenile justice to students in public high schools. Started in 1999 in classrooms in the District of Columbia and Maryland, this vibrant program has now spread nationwide. The original vision of Professor Jamin Raskin to teach tomorrow's leaders about their basic civil rights and responsibilities has reached thousands of young people. Its impact has become exponential.



### MARSHALL-BRENNAN FELLOWS SHARE AN INTENSE DESIRE TO SERVE.

Each year, fellowships are awarded to a limited number of JD and LL.M. students who have done well in Constitutional Law and have shown a desire to teach. They are mentored by Associate Director Maryam Ahranjani, Professor Stephen Wermiel, and other faculty. Participants in the Marshall-Brennan Project are motivated by a desire to serve the community and make a difference in the lives of young people. The teaching is based on constitutional law and uses significant U.S. Supreme Court cases involving students to help high school juniors and seniors learn about law, courts, and their own rights. The purpose is to counteract the effects of “civic illiteracy” among America’s young people by providing rigorous education about how the U.S. Constitution affects them, their schools, and their families.

### WE THE STUDENTS.

The Marshall-Brennan Project is named in honor of the late United States Supreme Court Justices Thurgood Marshall and William J. Brennan, Jr., and has the enthusiastic support of Mrs. Cissy Marshall and the late Mrs. Mary Brennan. The Program uses the best-selling book, *We the Students*, now in its third edition and authored by Professor Jamin Raskin. The *We the Students* curriculum centers on free speech, freedom of religion, search and seizure, school discipline and due process, and race and gender discrimination. A second curriculum, titled *Youth Justice in America*, co-authored by Professor Maryam Ahranjani, also teaches high school students through edited case excerpts. This curriculum focuses on the juvenile justice system and the protections in the Bill of Rights for accused criminals.

### MOOT COURT COMPETITION.

Learning happens outside the classroom as well. Each year, student-teachers and high school students have the opportunity to attend field trips and hear guest speakers. Each fall and spring, the Marshall-Brennan Constitutional Literacy Project hosts a program-wide moot court competition for the students in local Marshall-Brennan classes. Students prepare and compete in their classrooms and the winners from each class are invited to compete against each other for a day-long, citywide oral argument contest held either at the law school or at the U.S. Courthouse for the District of Columbia. Students must learn the skill of weaving together arguments about the law and the facts of a hypothetical case, and they must be able to handle a series of questions from the judges. The winner is not determined based on how the judges would decide the case but on the effectiveness of the arguments by the lawyers, both for substance and for oral skills. High school students learn not only the law involved in the case but also valuable skills in public speaking, organization, and the ability to think on their feet. Winners receive a cash prize and an invitation to compete in the National High School Moot Court Competition.

**JAMIN B. RASKIN**

*Professor of Law*

*Director, Program on Law and Government*

Jamin Raskin is the director of the Program on Law and Government and founder of its acclaimed Marshall-Brennan Constitutional Literacy Project. He has written dozens of law review articles and essays and several influential books. An active constitutional and public interest lawyer, he has represented clients as diverse as Reverend Jesse Jackson, Ross Perot, and Greenpeace, and was chairman of Maryland's State Higher Education Labor Relations Board. He is a Maryland State Senator representing District 20 where he serves on the Judicial Proceedings Committee, the Joint Committee on Legislative Ethics, the Joint Committee on the Chesapeake Bay and the Atlantic Coast, and the Joint Committee on State-Federal Relations. His varied career in public life has included service as: general counsel of the National Rainbow Coalition, a member of President Clinton's first Transition Team, a state assistant attorney general, and chairman of a labor board. He received his BA and JD from Harvard University.



**MARY CLARK**

*Associate Professor of Law*

*Director, SJD Program*

Mary Clark directs the SJD Program and teaches Property, Legal Ethics, and a seminar on Women's Legal History/History of Women in the Legal Profession. Previously, she was a visiting lecturer and research scholar at Yale Law School, and a Supreme Court fellow with the Federal Judicial Center. She received her BA from Bryn Mawr College and her JD from Harvard Law School.

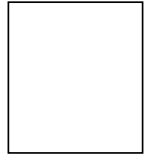
