Faculty will discuss projects in which you may become involved.

- **Innocence Project:** Become involved in investigating the cases of prisoners who may be innocent and could be exonerated based on DNA testing and/or the availability of new evidence.
- **International Human Rights:** Explore possibilities in the field of the promotion and protection of human rights, including impact litigation.
- **Marshall-Brennan Program:** Teach constitutional law in a D.C. public high school.
- **Public International Law and Policy Program:** Provide pro bono public international legal assistance to states and sub-state entities involved in peace negotiations and in drafting post-conflict constitutions.
- **Social Justice Seminar:** Address legal and related problems of those who need food stamps, the homeless, farmworkers and others at the bottom of the income scale. Small group course in which students work directly with national organizations like the National Law Center on Homelessness and Poverty, the Farmworker Justice Fund, the Food Research Action Committee and the Montgomery County Council on legal and related issues including amicus briefs, analysis of proposed legislation, revising manuals, etc.
- **Tribal Law:** Involve yourself in tribal law practice. Conduct research for tribal court judges, assist tribes with judicial development, and participate in the work of national Indian and Indigenous advocacy groups.
