INTERNATIONAL

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The LL.M. in International Arbitration and Business Law is a flexible (in-residence and hybrid) degree program designed for professionals and law graduates interested in commercial cross-border transactions and dispute settlement through arbitration. The faculty are accomplished arbitrators, practitioners, academics, and representatives from arbitral institutions. They bring a broad spectrum of practical experience to the classroom. The direct interaction and engagement with this exceptional faculty enables students to build valuable professional relationships.

The core courses of this LL.M. degree cover the fundamentals of international arbitration and business law, and include commercial and investment arbitration, alternative dispute resolution, international business transactions, international contracts and sales, and international investment law. The key electives complement the core courses and cover certain focus areas, such as choice-of-law issues in international arbitration, ICC arbitration, the calculation of damages in arbitration, mediation, negotiation, and international contract drafting.

The Center on International Commercial Arbitration

Under the direction of Professor Horacio Grigera Naón, AUWCL's Center on International Commercial Arbitration promotes **research and experiential** learning of international arbitration. The LL.M. students have the opportunity to work with the Center and benefit from its activities and resources. The Center organizes special conferences with prominent **guest speakers** and brings together arbitration alumni, practitioners, and legal counsel from arbitration centers from around the world at networking events.

Together with the **LL.M.** Career Counselor, the Center also supports students in seeking externships for credit while studying, and other career opportunities. The externships may take place at the leading international arbitration institutions, such as ICSID in Washington, D.C., and the International Chamber of Commerce in Paris, and at law firms with arbitration practice groups. LL.M. students can take part in the **Arbitration Summer Courses** for credit. These courses are taught by leading practitioners and provide a unique insight into the current status of international arbitration law and practice. The Center further organizes and hosts an **LL.M. moot arbitration competition**, where participant teams can further refine their advocacy skills applied to arbitration.

Optional Practical Training (OPT)

Eligible international LL.M. students may apply for an OPT permit. This training will provide students with the possibility of obtaining practical work experience in the U.S. for up to one year after graduation.

New York Bar Track

This LL.M. program provides foreign-educated law students with the courses required to qualify to sit for the New York bar exam. Foreign-trained LL.M. students must complete at least 12 credits of New York bar courses of the 24 credits needed for the LL.M. degree.
