2. Program location(s)	The Hague, The Netherlands
3. Description of program	<p>The Summer Law Program in The Hague offers participants an opportunity to study some of the most important legal issues today in the heart of the international justice community. The ABA-approved, six-credit summer program includes two three-credit courses: International Criminal Law and International Legal Approaches to Terrorism.</p> <p>The program was launched in June 2007, with 26 J.D. and LL.M. participants from six universities. It has since been expanded: in 2017, 31 students from the Washington College of Law and 8 from other institutions took part.</p> <p>The Program in The Hague is the product of a unique collaboration between the War Crimes Research Office of American University’s Washington College of Law, established in 1995 to provide specialized legal research assistance to international/ized criminal tribunals, and the T.M.C. Asser Instituut, one of the most prominent research institutes of international law in Europe.</p>

10. Description of each course (including credits)	<p>The academic component of the Program consists of two 3-credit courses.</p> <p><b>LAW 906-001: International Criminal Law: In Search of Accountability</b> will provide an introduction to international criminal law and explore the various ways in which national, internationalized and international courts and tribunals have attempted to enforce criminal responsibility for serious violations of human rights and humanitarian law. The course will also examine the role of states, their obligations under international law and the obstacles in bringing to justice those responsible for international crimes.</p> <p><b>LAW 907-001: International Legal Approaches to Terrorism in the 21st Century</b> will examine counter-terrorism measures from an international and comparative law perspective and consider the interrelation between these measures and the obligations of states under international human rights and humanitarian law. The course will explore the status of different international players under international law and address questions such as: What is the definition of terrorism? Is the use of force in response to acts of terrorism permitted under international law? Is international law adequately equipped to deal with the “war on terror”?</p> <p>Each session is taught by experts and/or practitioners in the field, including judges, prosecutors, and other personnel from institutions such as the International Court of Justice, the International Criminal Court, the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia, the Special Tribunal for Lebanon, as well as</p>

	representatives from the T.M.C. Asser Instituut, and other international organizations.
11. Schedule of classes (including days and times for each)	Classes will be held at the T.M.C. Asser Instituut, Monday through Thursday from 9:00 am to 11:05 am and from 11:15 am to 1:20 pm
12. Student performance requirements	Students are expected to complete assigned readings, participate regularly in all scheduled classes and events and successfully pass a final written exam for each course. Class attendance is required.
13. Grading method	The course grade will be based on attendance, participation and the final exam.

Statement that student's home school determines acceptance of credit received (for course, externship or clinical offering)	Applicants who intend to transfer credits should inquire about their law school's policy on that issue: acceptance of any credit or grade for any course taken in the program, including externships or any clinical offerings, is subject to determination by the student's home school. Applicants should be aware that participation in the program is unlikely to accelerate graduation for a full-time student.
17. Descriptive biography of the program director	Susana SáCouto directs the War Crimes Research Office of the Washington College of Law, which promotes the development and enforcement of international criminal law and international humanitarian law. She is also Professorial Lecturer-in-Residence at the Washington College of Law, where she teaches courses on

	<p>international criminal law, international legal responses to conflict-based sexual and gender violence. Ms. SáCouto’s background includes extensive practical experience with organizations working on human rights issues at both the domestic and international level, including Women Empowered Against Violence, Inc., the Office of the Prosecutor at the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia, the Center for Human Rights Legal Action in Guatemala, and the Florence Immigrant and Refugee Rights Project. She also served as co-chair of the Women’s International Law Interest Group of the American Society for International Law, and was awarded The Women’s Law Center 22nd Annual Dorothy Beatty Memorial Award for significant contributions to women’s rights.</p> <p>SáCouto earned her J.D. from Northeastern University Law School and her Master’s from the Fletcher School of Law &amp; Diplomacy at Tufts University.</p>
<p>18. Descriptive biographies (including academic credentials and experience) of each faculty member contributing to a course</p>	<p>Teresa Godwin Phelps joined the faculty at Washington College of Law in 2006 as Professor of Law and Director of the Legal Rhetoric Program. Before that, she was on the faculty at the University of Notre Dame Law School where she taught and directed legal writing since 1980. She holds three degrees from Notre Dame, including a Ph.D. in English and one degree from Yale Law School. At Notre Dame she was also a Fellow of the Joan B. Kroc Institute for International Peace Studies.</p> <p>Professor Phelps teaches Legal Rhetoric and has published widely in the field, including a seminal article, “The New Legal Rhetoric” in 1986 that helped to establish a new legal writing pedagogy. She was a founding member of the Legal Writing Institute and served on its Board of Directors, and she is a member of the Association of Legal Writing Directors (ALWD) and serves on the Editorial Board of the Journal of the Association of Legal Writing Directors. Her other teaching and academic interests include law and</p>

	<p>literature, international truth commissions, women and the law, and human rights, and she has published over thirty articles and three books, most recently <i>Shattered Voices: Language, Violence, and the Work of Truth Commissions</i> (University of Pennsylvania Press, 2004, paper 2006). She has lectured internationally on women’s rights and on truth commission reports. She often gives presentations and seminars on improving legal writing to other legal writing teachers, practicing attorneys, and judges.</p> <p>Professor Phelps won a Lilly Foundation Grant in 1988, and in 1999 won the Grenville Clark Award, which honors members of the University of Notre Dame community whose voluntary activities and public service advance the cause of peace and human rights. She was awarded the Legal Writing Institute’s Courage Award for 2011.</p> <p>In 2016, the Legal Writing Institute established the Teresa Godwin Phelps Award for Scholarship in Legal Communication. The annual awards will recognize outstanding scholarship within the legal writing discipline. One or more awards will be given each year for scholarly articles or essays; if warranted, additional awards may be presented for outstanding books within the discipline. In establishing the award, the Legal Writing Institute stated, “Naming these awards in your honor recognizes your exemplary scholarship, your consistent encouragement of others' scholarly work, and the foundational article that has nourished and influenced all subsequent study of the field, <i>The New Legal Rhetoric</i>.”</p>
